NHS Program Saturday May 13th

The Bradford station was end of the line on the Concord to Claremont Railroad for twenty years beginning in 1850. The climb to Lake Sunapee of 100 feet per mile was almost impossible for a train. And ten thousand cubic feet of granite rock at the Newbury summit barred the way.

NHS member John Lyons, will present a free slide-show about the challenge of extending the railroad from Bradford to Newbury and on to Claremont. Learn about how the impossible became only difficult and the steamboat era began.

When? Saturday May 13th at 10-11 a.m. in the Community Room of the Town Office complex. Everyone is welcome.



Fire Department

Newbury residents should keep in mind that when you call 911, you need to remain on the line until you talk to a dispatcher. The dispatcher may ask you to remain on the line with them until medical help or law enforcement arrives at your location.

If you called 911 in error, do not hang up. The dispatcher will call back and if the phone is not answered, the police will be sent to your address.

If you call 911 during a storm or there is a major highway incident and the call volume is extremely high, the dispatcher may have to temporarily put you on hold. Do not hang up or try to call back. Stay on the line for the dispatcher and they will be back to you as soon as possible. Be prepared to provide as much information as possible about your emergency including your location.



9-1-1 CALLER TIPS

If you have an emergency and need immediate assistance, keep these tips in mind when dialing 9-1-1

Know your location and telephone number

These are the two most important pieces of information you will need when dialing 9-1-1. Dispatchers will confirm this information so emergency crews know where to go and how to reach you.

Stay calm and listen to the dispatcher

Take a deep breath and try to maintain your composure. Our dispatchers are typing the information into a computer and it may seem to be taking a while. However, emergency services are already being sent while you are still on the line.

Do not hang up the call

Follow all instructions and do not hang up until directed to do so by the dispatcher. Our call-takers are Emergency Medical Dispatchers, and are trained to provide patient care instructions until a higher level of care arrives on scene. Note: You may hear ringing and clicking when we notify your local agencies.

Remember you can also “TEXT 911” in a situation where you have poor service or you can not talk.

New Fire Department Pumper

Newbury Fire Rescue wishes to thank the Newbury voters who attended this year’s Town Meeting and supported the warrant article for the new fire department pumper. The new truck will replace the department’s 1988 Engine 2, which has served the department well for 35 years. Because of the backlog in the country for heavy trucks, delivery of the new engine is not expected for at least two years.

Fire Permits

Newbury Residents are reminded that the State of New Hampshire requires a permit from the Forest Fire Warden for all outside burning when there is not full snow cover. This includes campfires, fire pits and outside fireplaces, which are considered either Category I, a small camp or cooking fire not more than 2ft in diameter or Category II, a fireplace more than 2ft but less than 4ft in diameter. Permits are issued for the calendar year, so if you were issued a permit in 2022 a new permit will be required. A seasonal permit can be issued for these cooking type fires through the State of New Hampshire online permit system www.NHFirePermit.com.

The website lets you request and print a permit from your computer, the vendor operating the site does charge a \$5.50 service fee to process the permit. Fires greater than 4 ft in diameter, such as brush piles require a Category III Permit which is issued by the Forest Fire Warden for the day of the burning, these are not issued on a seasonal basis. Contact Forest Fire Warden, Dave Smith at 938-5925 to schedule a permit inspection. Street Address Signs

Newbury Fire Rescue is making available to Newbury residents reflective street address signs to post at their homes. If you are interested in ordering one of the signs, please download the form, print and complete the requested information. Mail with your check to Newbury Fire Department. The completed sign will be delivered to your home by Newbury Firefighters who will assist you with the placement of the sign. These address signs meet the Town of Newbury Street Numbering Ordinance requires that every home and business in Newbury has a street address posted that is visible from the road. The reason for the ordinance was to ensure that emergency responders would be able to locate a property in the event of a medical emergency, fire, or other emergency. If you do not currently have street numbers posted, this program will provide an attractive street number sign for your property and help emergency responders find you more quickly in an emergency.



Roadway Safety

Be safe when you walk or jog along the highway. Always run or walk against the traffic. Wear visible clothing that drivers can see you, especially in the early morning or at dusk.

Hiking Safety

As we get into the spring months, thoughts of hiking to Lake Solitude, the summit of Mount Sunapee or other trails in the area. If you are planning on a day, or longer hike, please be prepared. Last year, Newbury Fire Rescue responded to a number of hiker rescue calls, some requiring the assistance of New Hampshire Fish and Game and the Upper Valley Wilderness Response Team. If you are planning a hike, please be prepared with appropriate clothing and hiking boots, water and snacks, a flashlight and cell phone with extra batteries. Always let someone know where you are hiking and the time that you expect to return.

On Wednesday, May 17, from 7-9 pm at the Newbury Fire Department, there will be a presentation on hiking safety by New Hampshire Fish and Game Conservation Officer Jim Cyr, who appeared on the Northwoods Law TV series. He will discuss hiking on Mount Sunapee and other trails in New Hampshire, what hikers need to do to be safe on the mountain and what is involved if a hiker becomes lost or injured. The presentation is cosponsored by Newbury Fire Rescue and the Newbury Library. Parking for the presentation is available at the playground parking lot.







Center Meeting House

Since the Center Meeting House is not heated, the 1830's building is closed up for the winter after the Tree Lighting on the first Sunday of December. Like you, we look forward to the warmer weather. This year our scheduled events begin with the screening of THE FORGOTTEN FOREST PRIMEVAL: Rediscovering Mount Sunapee's Old Growth. The film will be screened on Monday, June 19th at 7PM and we are very pleased that the film's maker, Ray Asselin, and others involved in the creation of the documentary about our own Mount Sunapee will be at the event to answer any questions.

For Old Home Day (July 8), the Newbury Historical Society joins with the Center Meeting House for an OPEN HOUSE from 10AM until 2PM with slides and photographs of PEOPLE & PLACES OF OLD NEWBURY from Bill Weiler's extensive collection of Historic Newbury photographs. See if you can recognize where you are!

Our building was never a Church but was used by many different religions. In the summer, visiting preachers would draw large gatherings of folks from around the lake. In that Old Home Day spirit, the South Newbury Union Church holds its Sunday, July 9th, 10AM service in the Center Meeting House and invites everyone to join them.

Each summer season, we present a speaker series. This year we are looking at Hard Times & "Unusual" Happenings in the Granite State. There is an old saying "the poor are always with us." On Sunday, July 30th at 4PM, Steve Taylor will present the NH Humanities program POOR HOUSES & TOWN FARMS: THE HARD ROW FOR PAUPERS.

New Hampshire has always struggled with issues surrounding the treatment of the poor ... some of which will surprise you. On Monday, August 7th at 7PM, Mary Kronenwetter, the author of PAUPER AUCTION, will discuss her fascinating historical novel and the extensive research behind it. This program is co-hosted by the Newbury Library, Newbury Historical Society, and the Center Meeting House. And yes, your Center Meeting House was the site of some Town Meetings and some pauper auctions.

With our next program we turn from the agricultural poor to the industrial. Robert B. Perreault focuses his NH Humanities program on PUTTING A HUMAN FACE ON THE TEXTILE INDUSTRY: THE WORKERS OF THE AMOSKEAG MANUFACTURING COMPANY. We have all driven by the beautiful mill buildings now repurposed for housing, businesses and schools in Manchester but what was it like to work there? This will be held on Monday, September 18, at 7PM

We invite you all to join us and the Newbury Library this summer for these free programs. In the fall we will explore the ALIEN ABDUCTION of Betty & Barney Hill on October 2nd and delve into the truth of CASE CLOSED ON THE 1873 SMUTTYNOSE AX MURDERS on October 30th.
