The Selectboard has been going through the budget process with the Budget Committee and it looks like (with the proposed budget and separate warrant articles) we are projecting the town tax rate will likely go down. All told, we had a cost savings in health insurance and other areas of the budget.

The proposed warrant articles are fewer this year than in past years. There is a warrant article for a new oneton dump truck for the highway department. All of these funds will come out of the highway equipment capital reserve fund and from the trade-in of the old dump truck. Also, the Town will be making additional payments into the existing capital reserve and expendable trust funds per the Capital Improvements Program (CIP).

The only other warrant article that will be brought to Town Meeting (as of now) is an article for a new fire station. This would be a bond article and would not require any payment on the bond until 2019. The article will have public hearings and information will be provided on the website. The dollar amount has not been finalized yet. The cost will be finalized at the bond public hearing which will take place in February. The Selectboard has chosen Peter Tennant of Tennant Goucher in Manchester to be the architect and North Branch Construction in Concord to be the construction manager for this project. North Branch Construction Chief Executive Officer is Kenneth Holmes, who is a taxpayer here in Newbury.

Finally, it was great to see all the local businesses show their holiday spirit with the lights and decorations for our "Light up Newbury" contest. We had great attendance for the tree lighting. Thank you to our residents for being part of it all. Be on the lookout for new expanded programs and events from our Recreation Department. 

Calls for the year

Carbon Monoxide Detectors

Carbon Monoxide (CO) is a colorless and odorless gas that results from the burning of fuels that can be dangerous and even deadly to anyone who is exposed to the fumes. The most common source of CO are improperly vented furnaces, stoves and portable generators. Often, people are not aware of carbon monoxide in the home until they become ill. The only early warning sign of carbon monoxide is to have carbon monoxide detectors in the home.

CO detectors should be located on every level of the house and outside of each bedroom. When the carbon monoxide detector sounds, you should call 911 and evacuate the house. Batteries should be replaced on an annual basis. Keep in mind that CO detectors are only good for seven years and should be replaced after that time.

We recommend that when traveling, you bring a travel CO alarm that is designed to protect you in the event that your lodgings are not equipped with carbon monoxide detectors.

Weather Emergency Contact Program

The heavy snow and extreme cold weather has resulted in a great deal of activity for the Town of Newbury Weather Emergency Contact Program. Under this program, older or disabled Newbury residents who may have difficulty getting out or need assistance during severe weather, register for a contact list that is maintained by Newbury Fire Rescue.

This is how it works: During or following a storm The year 2017 was a record year for Newbury Fire or power failure, registered residents are called by phone year. This year, the weather has necessitated numerous calls and a number of special assistance responses by the fire department. In one instance, when a resident was running low on heating oil (because the oil truck could not get to the house) an emergency supply of heating oil was delivered by the fire department. In another situation, a path was shoveled to a resident's door so they could get out.

Severe Weather Safety Reminders

As we suffer through this harsh winter, there are a number of personal safety activities that everyone should keep in mind. Also, please remember: if you do have an emergency, call 911.

- After a snow storm, clear all of your doors of snow so you can get out in an emergency. Many people shovel a path from the one door that they normally use and forget about the others. If the main door is blocked by fire, be sure that you have another escape route.
- Be sure that your street address on your house or mail box is visible from the road and not covered with snow. This is important. First responders must be able to see your street address when responding in a fire or medical emergency.
- Be sure that furnace vents are not blocked by drifting snow or snow that may have slid off the roof. One of the leading causes of carbon monoxide poisoning is blocked furnace vents.
- Gasoline-powered generators should never be run in a house, garage or within 10 feet of the building because they produce deadly carbon monoxide fumes.
- Keep pipes from freezing. This may mean keeping the kitchen sink cabinet doors open on nights when the temperature goes below zero. If the pipes do freeze, be sure that you know the location of the water shut-off and that you can quickly turn off the water to prevent flooding. If you suspect a frozen pipe, shut off the water when you leave for work in the morning.

Training

2017 was one of the most active years for training in the history of Newbury Fire Rescue. 2018 is starting out the same way with two fire department members enrolled in the Firefighter I class through the NH Department of Safety, Fire Standards & Training Fire Academy at Lakes Region Community College. Another department member is continuing his education in the Fire Science program at Southern Maine Community College.

During 2017, training accounted for 27% of the department's payroll budget with members attending over 50 individual training programs. One Newbury firefighter graduated from the Firefighter I program in 2017. In addition to the 23 regularly scheduled in-house training sessions, firefighters and EMTs attended conferences at the North Country and Central NH EMS Conferences, New Hampshire Fire Academy, Hazmat conferences in Concord and Baltimore, and regional training sessions. There were also a number of on-line training classes that members took on their own.
