# **Center Meeting House**

We were so happy that many of you joined us for our Annual Events at the winding down of 2022. At Thanks for Giving 2022, we honored our Town Administrator, Dennis Pavlicek, whose knowledge and dedication have helped Newbury navigate a changing world this year and each year. Please share your ideas for a 2023 Thanks for Giving honoree to be recognized on the next Sunday before Thanksgiving (11/19/23) service.

The Lighting of Alice's Tree, Newbury's Christmas Tree, on the first Sunday in December is always a fun way to gather and welcome the holidays. We sing, we ring the bell, and then we feast. We started a new tradition this past year. We held a drawing to select what family or individual would "Ring the Bell" and another to select who would "Light the Tree." If you would like to do either, be sure to enter your name at the library for the drawings.

As you all know CMH is not heated, so the building is closed for the winter. We will open the spring season in early June with a screening of THE FORGOTTEN FOREST PRIMEVAL: REDISCOVERING MOUNT SUNAPEE. We hope to have some of the principals who made this documentary about our own backyard join us. This season we will be joining with the Newbury Library, Historical Society and The Fells to present a program with Mary Kronenwetter, author of PAUPER AUCTION. Her well researched and atmospheric novel provides us with a window into life in rural NH in 1805. Another view of early life here in NH when times were hard is Steve Taylor's NH Humanities program POOR HOUSE & TOWN FARM: The Hard Row for Paupers. Some of you may remember or have heard about Betty & Barney Hill who in Sept. 1961 claimed to have been abducted by aliens in the White Mountains of NH. This was the first well documented, feasibly legitimate UFO abduction in history. Their papers now are in the special collections at UNH and the archivist there will join us to explore this piece of NH history.

We have more NH people, place and things to explore in the new year. Once all the dates for the programs are finalized, they will be shared on the Center Meeting House website, Facebook page, and our old style stone sign. Please keep an eye out and join us to explore the unusual in our own backyard.



### **Taking Trees Down ?? Wait !!**

In New Hampshire, timber is considered real estate. To encourage conservation of our natural resources, it is not taxed until it is cut down. In accordance with RSA Chapter 79, Forest Conservation and Taxation, an "Intent to Cut" application (PA-7) must be completed and submitted to the Town before any timber can be cut from any property. The application can be completed by the logger but must be signed by the owner (s), as the owner (s) are the people responsible for the payment of the yield tax.

### It is a property owner's responsibility to know the rules, before hiring the logger

There can be exceptions to the tax:

The law allows for up to 10,000 board feet of logs or 20 cords of wood yield tax free per tax year, <u>so</u> <u>long as the wood is used for the personal use of the owner.</u> The logs or wood cannot be sold or even given in lieu of payment for the timber cut; a yield tax would be issued if that were the case.

For purposes of land conversion, such as building a new house, the Intent to Cut is not required if less than 10,000 board feet or 20 cords of wood are cut and building permits are in place.

If there is any question regarding the applicability of the law, **please** reach out to our offices to discuss your situation before making any assumptions.

Fines for non-compliance range up to \$2,000. A Doomage penalty may be assessed for improper reporting. A Doomage penalty will make the tax twice what it would have been if the Report had been timely filed and truly reported. The DRA and NH Division of Forest & Lands have the authority to issue a cease and desist for any cutting operation not in compliance with RSA 79.

# **Fire Department News**

### **Weather Emergency Contact List**

Newbury Residents are reminded of the Weather Emergency Contact Program. Under this program, older or disabled Newbury residents, who may have difficulty getting out or may need assistance during severe weather register for a contact list that is maintained by Newbury Fire Rescue. During or following a storm or power failure, these individuals are called by phone to verify that they are OK. If we are not able to contact the person on the phone, a firefighter goes to the house to check on the individual.

### **Heating Safety**

With the cold winter weather and high oil and gas prices, some residents are using electric space heaters to keep their homes warm. Please be safe and only use approved heaters with a tip over feature that shuts the heater off if the unit falls over.

Electric heaters should always be plugged directly into a wall outlet, extension cords and power strips should not be used. Always keep combustible furniture and materials, such as drapes away from the heater. Turn the heater off before you go to bed or leave the house.



### **Street Address Signs**



As mentioned in a previous newsletter, Newbury Fire Rescue is offering Newbury residents reflective street address signs to post at their homes. If you are interested in ordering one of these signs, please download the form, print and complete the requested information. Mail with your check to the Newbury Fire Department. The completed sign will be delivered to your home by Newbury Firefighters who will assist you with the placement of the sign.

These address signs meet the Town of Newbury Street Numbering Ordinance which requires that every home and business in Newbury has a street number posted that is visible from the road. The reason for the ordinance is to ensure that emergency responders are able to locate a property in the event of a medical emergency, fire, or other emergency. If you do not currently have street numbers posted, this program will provide an attractive street number sign for your property and help responders find you quickly in an emergency.

# **Fire Department News Continued**

### **Traffic Collisions**

This fall, Newbury Fire Rescue responded to a number of serious motor vehicle incidents on Newbury roads. Fortunately, these crashes did not result in serious personal injuries. Traditionally, the winter months have been a time when the frequency of vehicle collisions increase. There are two areas on Route 103 where a significant number of crashes occur, they are Ledge Hill between South Newbury and the center of town and the area of Birch Grove and Lakewood Manor roads on Route 103 west of town. Both of these

areas have steep hills which tend to freeze before other parts of the highway. Unfortunately, drivers tend to drive too fast in these sections and slide off the road or skid into another vehicle or an object along the road.

Route 103 is a state highway and is plowed and sanded by the New Hampshire Department of Transportation. Conditions in hilly Newbury may be quite different than at DOT headquarters in Concord and when DOT is notified by police or fire, it may take an hour to get a plow and sander to Newbury to plow and treat the road.



Please drive safely, not only on the state highways but also on Newbury town roads. A road that looks wet may actually be covered with black ice. Many motorists regularly exceed the posted speed limit while traveling through our town. This can be disastrous when the roads are covered with ice and snow.



### New Rescue 1

After many delays caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and supply chain issues delaying delivery for two years, the new Newbury Rescue 1 has finally arrived in Newbury. The new four-wheel drive truck, which is replacing the 2004 Ford Rescue 1, the busiest piece of apparatus in the Newbury Fire Rescue fleet.

The new rescue was custom designed for the department and has a larger capacity, enabling the new truck to carry heavy rescue equipment, that was carried on another truck in addition to the emergency medical supplies and equipment carried on the old truck.

### **Children's Holiday Event**

Again, this past holiday season, the Newbury Fire Department Association conducted its successful children's holiday gift delivery. Newbury residents with young children registered online and Santa Clause arrived in a fire truck to deliver a present to each boy and girl.



# **Newbury Energy Committee**

The Newbury Energy Committee has been working hard to address the energy needs of our community. In August we held an informational meeting with representatives from Eversource in order to understand their approach to distribution network maintenance and upgrades and to identify opportunities for cooperation. Topics discussed included emergency response, community power, and the Blodgett's network.

On September 19 Newbury Energy cohosted a showing of the film "Microplastic Madness" with the Newbury Public Library. This film has been shown all over New Hampshire as part of the Ten Towns initiative to limit the use of single use plastics.

One of our members, Andrew Cockerill, has been investigating food waste in collaboration with Kearsarge Climate Action. He was instrumental in encouraging our town to send a letter to the Dept. Of Agriculture in support of the Center for EcoTechnology's USDA Rural Utility Service Waste Management Grant Proposal.

On October 3, Steve Remen of our committee briefed the Selectboard on our desire to continue to investigate alternative Energy suppliers such as Community Power to enable lower energy costs for the town. We were given approval and hosted a second meeting with Henry Herndon of the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire on Nov. 28. The committee expects to raise a warrant article on this at the annual town meeting.

Our members Sue Kelly and Tracy Wood once again outdid themselves at Newbury's Truck or Treat celebration with an interactive exhibit on weatherization, demonstrating ways to save power in your home.

On October 31, Newbury Energy celebrated the completion of our municipal solar array at the Waste Water Treatment facility at Blodgett's Landing with a ribbon cutting. Dennis Pavlicek, our town administrator, Ed Thorson, Selectboard member, and former Selectboard member Joy Nowell as well as Energy Committee members and Newbury residents attended. The facility will produce 100kW ac of electricity for the town. Output can be monitored on the town website. Many thanks to Mary Fuller and her solar subcommittee for getting this project to the finish line.

We hope in the near future to bring residents more information about the rebates available through the Inflation Reduction Act, residential solar and heat pumps.
