



Newbury Emergency Management Department

Local Emergency Operations Plan

During the past winter and early spring, the Newbury Emergency Management Department worked on completing and submitting, to New Hampshire Homeland Security and Emergency Management, the Local Emergency Operations Plan for the Town of Newbury. The town's emergency plan, which is required by the State of New Hampshire for all cities and towns was last written in 2008, it had been updated over the years, but this was the first total revision to the state's new plan format.

The plan addresses the types of emergencies that could impact Newbury, and procedures that are put in place. It identifies how the town will respond to a disaster or serious emergency that overtaxes the emergency resources of the town. Procedures are outlined for obtaining mutual aid from area communities as well as resources from the State of New Hampshire and the federal government.

Newbury's new fire station will contain a state-of-the-art Emergency Operations Center (EOC) which will have the capabilities for local officials to manage a disaster and adequately communicate by radio, phone and computer with first responders, surrounding communities and the State Emergency Operations Center in Concord. The operations plan was updated to incorporate the new equipment and capabilities of the EOC.

Fire Department News



Vaccination Super Site

Newbury Firefighters along with members of other departments, hospital staff and others participated in two State of New Hampshire Vaccination Super Sites, held at New Hampshire Motor Speedway in Loudon on two different weekends in March. The Super Sites provided 10,000 doses of the vaccine on the three-day weekend and 8,000 doses on the two-day weekend. Newbury personnel also assisted at the NH National Guard fixed vaccination sites in Claremont and Concord. After a couple of glitches at the start of the first day in Loudon, the operation became very efficient with the people receiving the vaccination never having to leave their cars. They drove into large tents where 40 vaccination teams worked at the same time. In most cases the people were able to get in, get their shot, spend 15 minutes in observation (to be sure there were not any side effects) and be on their way. The first responders were compensated for these details by the town which is reimbursed by the State of New Hampshire for their time in this mass vaccination work. These events also gave the emergency medical personnel valuable clinical training that they would not have ordinarily experienced.

FROST

Newbury Fire Rescue participated in the First Responder Optional Screening Test (FROST) program from December through March. The COVID-19 testing program, administered by the State of New Hampshire Fire Standards and Training and EMS provided weekly COVID-19 testing for first responders, a high at-risk category in the state. The tests were administered by EMS personnel once week to Newbury firefighters, Newbury police and Bradford police officers. The results of the tests were reported weekly to the state. Anyone testing positive for the antigen test would take a PCR test at a state designated location. If the PCR test was positive, the person would quarantine and not return to work until after the quarantine period. In the towns participating in the program, if first responders tested positive, they were taken off the job before they could infect their co-workers or the public. The testing ended in April when most of the first responders in the state were fully vaccinated.

Community Outreach

As discussed in previous newsletters, Newbury Fire Rescue maintains a listing of community residents who may be homebound, either because of disabilities, advanced age, or lack of transportation. For several years, during severe weather incidents such as blizzards or ice storms, these people are contacted by phone by department members to check on their wellbeing. If we are not able to get in touch with that person a department member or police officer goes to that residence to check on that person.

Spring Fishing Safety

With ice out on Lake Sunapee many fishermen are anxious to get out on the lake and start the fishing season. Even though the sun and air temperatures are warm, the temperature of Lake Sunapee is still in the upper 30s or low 40s. With these very low water temperatures it takes very little time for a person who may fall in the water to develop hypothermia. It is recommended that a life vest always be worn as immersion in the very cold water may lead to the inability to swim or unconsciousness. Please be safe on the water, if possible do not go out alone and always wear your life jacket, even if you are a good swimmer.

New Fire Station

As most residents know, construction on the new Fire Rescue Station for Newbury is progressing well. With the relatively mild winter, most of the exterior work on the building was completed during the winter and early spring. Work continues on the interior of the building with the construction work expected to be done in late spring or early summer. During the summer department members will assist with moving from the Safety Services Building to the new station, with full occupancy by the department in the early fall. An open house of the new building for town residents will be planned at that time.



Fire Permits Renewal

Newbury Residents are reminded that the State of New Hampshire requires a permit from the Forest Fire Warden for all outside burning. This includes campfires, cooking fires and outside fireplaces, no more than 2 ft in diameter which are considered Category I and Category II, which is a campfire more than 2ft but less than 4ft in diameter. A seasonal permit can be issued for these cooking type fires by the Warden. If you have been issued a Category I or II permit in the past, these permits can be renewed on-line on the Newbury Fire Rescue website www.newburyfd.org. New permits are issued by the Warden after an inspection to verify that the fireplace/fire pit is in compliance with the state laws and rules.

Fires greater than 4 ft in diameter, such as brush piles, require a Category III permit which is issued by the Forest Fire Warden for the day of the burning, these are not issued on a seasonal basis. Complete information on the state regulations, contacting the Warden and if there are questions can be found on the website noted above.

In 2020, the State of New Hampshire was in a drought and the lack of snow during this past winter has resulted in the woodlands becoming very dry and the potential for wildfires is great. Please be careful with fire and follow the state rules. Outside burning permits are not issued on HIGH Fire Danger Days. Residents should monitor the fire danger listed on the sign at the Safety Services Building and posted on the Newbury Fire Rescue Facebook Page.

Street Numbering

Check your street number visibility when you do spring yard work. During the past winter there were several windstorms that brought down trees and limbs in our yards. Spring yard cleanup is a good time to verify that the street address number on your house can be clearly seen from the road by emergency responders. If your house cannot be seen, the number needs to be posted on a mailbox, post, or tree near your driveway so fire and emergency medical responders can find you in an emergency.

Newbury's Street Numbering Ordinance states that the numbers of your street address must be visible from the road. The ordinance states that the numbers should be at least 4" in height and reflective so they can be seen at night. If you do call 911 please put an outside light on and have someone watch for the emergency responders.

Newbury Housing Committee

The Newbury Housing Committee has been meeting monthly since September 2020. With the assistance of Steve Whitman of Resilience Planning and Design, we have accomplished a good chunk of the groundwork that will be necessary to critically review our Town Land-Use Ordinances and recommend changes that will support housing diversity. A list of FAQs about the Committee and our work is at the end of this update. All the meeting minutes and dates of upcoming meetings are on the Town website: www.newburynh.org.

Our last meeting was a Panel Presentation by professionals who are developers or financiers of work-force housing and affordable housing.

Ms. Freeman noted that the purpose of the Panel presentation and Q and A that evening was to further the education of the committee and the community about housing types, work force and affordable housing and how it is developed. To that end, three professionals, all representing different aspects of developing work force housing had been asked to participate. They were Jim Manihane, the Director of Multi-Family Organizations and Business Development with the New Hampshire Housing Finance Agency (NHHFA); Andrew Winter, Executive Director of Twin Pines Housing Trust, a non-profit housing developer in the Upper Valley; and Kevin Lacasse, Owner and founder of New England Family Housing, a for-profit workforce/affordable housing developer.

This meeting was recorded, a link to the recording and the recording of the public outreach meeting in January are available on Newbury Town website.

Newbury Housing Committee FAQ

What is the Newbury Housing Committee (NHC)?

The NHC is an ad-hoc committee of the Newbury Planning Board that was formed to address housing needs in Newbury.

Why was the NHC Formed?

During the development of the Town's most recent Master Plan (MP) ("Envision Newbury 2027"), affordable, alternative housing was the single most referenced topic by town residents in the "survey" and in "public forums". As a result, in the MP, the highest priority Action Item for both the Planning Board and the Selectboard was to review and amend the zoning regulations to encourage development of a variety of housing types beyond single-family residential units. Finally, NH State RSAs (State Regulations) require that all NH towns provide opportunity to create Work Force Housing (WFH). Each town must have land use regulations that permit and support the development of WFH.

Who does the NHC report to?

The NHC reports to the Planning Board but ultimately to the residents of Newbury. Any changes to the Zoning Ordinances that the committee proposes will be presented to the Town at Public Hearings where the residents are free to comment and suggest changes or eliminate the proposal. If the Public Hearing results in a general consensus on the changes or if the Town decides that the changes need to be made the proposed changes will then be voted on in the March Town Meeting. The Town will then vote to approve or disapprove.

How was the NHC formed?

In September 2020, the Newbury Selectboard and Planning Board initiated the formation of a Housing Committee to review Newbury's land use regulations with the eventual goal of amending regulations to create a wider range of housing opportunities in town. The Committee was formed by posting, on line and in public places, to the town residents for volunteers. Eighteen volunteers stepped forward. Barbara Freeman was asked to chair the Committee because of her experience as a planner and having been a Planning Board Chair in the past.

Who is on the NHC?

Currently the committee is comprised of 19 individuals who are all residents of Newbury, in addition, Steve Whitman, of Resilience Planning and Design (RPD), who was a consultant for the 2017 Newbury Master Plan (MP), was hired to update the data from the MP and assist the committee with its work.

How will the NHC work?

The work is based on the Newbury strategic MP ("Envision Newbury 2027") that was completed in 2017 with wide Town input and the assistance of Steve Whitman. The work plan is on the Town website (Housing Initiative Scope of Work). The committee meets on the fourth Tuesday of each month at 7PM to review and accomplish the work described in the work plan. All of these meetings are open to the public and have meeting minutes which are then posted on the Town website. If you would like to attend any meeting, contact Barbara Freeman at www.mehrenfreeman@aol.com. There will also be two more (one was held in January) public outreach meetings to obtain feedback from the wider town at critical stages of the work. Finally there will be one or two Public Hearings to review any changes to the Land Use Regulations proposed by the Committee. The final changes will be brought before the town for vote at 2022 Town Meeting.

There will also be two more (one was held in January) public outreach meetings to obtain feedback from the wider town at critical stages of the work. Newbury Energy Committee

The Newbury Energy committee was formed in November of 2020 and now has eight members. Our committee meets the third Monday of every month at 4:00 PM, virtually at this time. Our first project was to arrange a lighting audit of all the town buildings. This was performed by World Energy, a representative of Eversource. As a result, LED lighting will be installed in the Town Office, the Transfer Station, the Vets Hall, and the Waste Treatment Facility. This project will reduce energy use by 45%, pay for itself in 2.9 years, and save the town \$6,843 over 10 years. We encourage residents and local businesses to consider switching to LED lighting. According to the Department of Energy, LED bulbs last 25% longer than regular bulbs and use 75% less energy.

One of our members has been working with Hannaford's Sustainability Group to examine how the New London store can further reduce food waste and energy use, and also how to eliminate single use plastics in food packaging. We hope to show a film on the threat plastics pose to our planet in the near future, thanks to the Newbury library.

We have a subcommittee that has begun research into the use of solar power in our town. They have begun to solicit bids from solar power companies, with the goal of possible construction of a solar array on the Highway Building. This is a long term project possibly involving a warrant article in 2022. We hope to offer a program on residential solar in the coming year.

We are also planning an HVAC audit of our town buildings which should result in considerable energy savings.

There is a lot of interest on our committee on the issue of food waste. Food waste makes up to 40% of our trash, and once it is in a landfill it creates methane, one of the worst greenhouse gases. One way to address this is through composting, and we have had preliminary discussions with the Library about offering programs on this subject. Check out Newbury Energy's Earth Day display in the Library starting April 22.

Revision Energy is doing a presentation on residential solar on April 28th, from 12-1, virtually. Information should be in the Shopper. Residents can contact me with their email and I will send them a link.





Aerosol cans, empty: Recycle with scrap metal. Talk to your town. (Bring cans with product in them to collection.)

Ammunition and explosives: State Police at 271-3636.

Asbestos: Get a licensed asbestos specialist. Asbestos is hazardous to your health—don't remove it yourself!

Batteries, alkaline: Most non-rechargeable batteries (AA, AAA, C, D, and 9-volt) are trash in NH. If in doubt, just bring to collection. Tape 9-volt terminals before disposal to avoid fire in your trash!

Batteries, automotive: Take to parts store for cash or your transfer station

Fire extinguishers: Recycle empty extinguishers (NRRRA takes from towns).

Fluorescent lights: May be taken at your town facility. Check with your town. Food Co-ops and Home Depot may take CFLs (spiral bulbs), not tubes.

Latex paint: Use kitty litter, sawdust, or shredded paper to dry out latex paint; throw in your trash. Empty, dry metal cans may be recycled as scrap metal at your recycling facility. If it says "clean up with soap and water," it's latex.

Medical sharps: Place in a rigid container (e.g. detergent bottle), seal cap with duct tape, and label container with marker, "Sharps, not for recycling."

Dispose of with regular trash by handing to a waste collector—can become a projectile if compacted in trash. *Lebanon Police Station accepts some sharps.*

Medicine: See www.twinstatesafemeds.com for police stations taking meds.

Propane or helium tanks: Propane/helium tanks can be exchanged/refilled at a distributor; or contact town transfer station about empty tanks.

Used motor oil: Take to town transfer station or a service station for recycling.

Tick Awareness

Ticks bites can make people sick. Below are some steps that you can take after a tick bite to reduce your chances of getting sick and how to get treatment promptly if you do get sick.

Remove the tick as soon as possible

1. Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin as you can.
2. Pull upward with steady, even pressure. Don't twist or jerk the tick.
3. After removing the tick, clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol or soap and water.
4. Dispose of the tick by flushing it down the toilet. If you would like to bring the tick to your healthcare provider for identification, put it in rubbing alcohol or place it in a sealed bag/

Consider calling your healthcare provider

In general, CDC does not recommend taking antibiotics after tick bites to prevent tickborne diseases. However, in certain circumstances, a single dose of doxycycline after a tick bite may lower your risk of Lyme disease. Consider talking to your healthcare provider if you live in an area where Lyme disease is common.

Watch for symptoms for 30 days

Call your healthcare provider if you get any of the following:

- Rash
- Headache
- Fever
- Muscle pain
- Fatigue
- Joint swelling and pain

Treatment for tickborne diseases should be based on symptoms, history of exposure to ticks, and in some cases, blood test results. Most tickborne diseases can be treated with a short course of antibiotics.
